From the Director

Art, education and the environment has a long standing history within the Muskegon community. The Lakeshore Art Festival continues that tradition by taking art and environmental stewardship to a new level. With over 300 fine artists, crafters, food vendors, children's activities and entertainment, we make it a priority to reduce our carbon footprint. Exhibitors and guests are reminded about the importance of recycling through our educational program and recycling bins placed throughout the event. Additionally, food vendors are requested to use compostable or post-consumer recycled products for their serving ware and nearly all organic food matter is placed into compost bins located behind each vendor. This year, we provided a water refilling station to reduce the amount of plastic water bottles used.

We are proud to be a festival that takes the lead in assuring a sustainable, artful future for many generations to come. We hope you join us every year, the first Friday and Saturday in July to experience the Lakeshore Art Festival!

WATER BOTTLE REDUCTION PROGRAM

Sponsored by locally based Kohley's Superior Water and Propane, a refillable water station was placed at the corner of Western and 3rd Ave for attendees to re-fill their water bottles.

RECYCLING PROGRAM

The festival continues to promote waste diversion through a comprehensive recycling program for attendees to capture lemonade cups, water bottles, pop cans, and other used beverage containers. Since 2014, 929 pounds of plastic and aluminum have been recycled.





FOOD WASTE COLLECTION

Over the last 4 years, the festival has captured 1,380 pounds of food waste and converted it into compost.

640, 16oz water bottles were saved by offering a free refillable water station at the festival information booth.

Recyclable plastic cups, made from 20% recycled plastic, were used at the beer and wine garden in the Fine Arts section.

At the education booth, located in the Children's Lane, attendees learned about recycling by playing the Bin It to Win It game. The interactive game allowed participants to guess how many aluminum cans were shredded to fill the case. The shredding of aluminum cans is the first step in the recycling process. After the cans are shredded, the aluminum is melted and turned into sheets that are purchased by manufacturers to create new products.

In the State of Michigan, the vast majority of aluminum cans are re-purposed into new aluminum cans. The new aluminum cans are back on store shelves within 60 days of being recycled.

Environmental Impact



NATURAL RESOURCES

285 gallons of gasoline saved. Reduction in oil consumption through recycling at Lakeshore Art Festival offsets the greenhouse gas emissions of 6,070 miles driven throughout Muskegon.



ENERGY CONSUMPTION

5,143 kilowatt hours of energy saved. This is enough energy to power one average home in Muskegon for 5.5 months.



LANDFILL SPACE

22 cubic yards of landfill space saved. This is enough volume to fill 4,541 (1) gallon jugs of milk.
